A Note from the Artistic Director

The afternoon I turned my attention to writing some thoughts on why we decided to include *On the Exhale* in theatre KAPOW's 16th season. I had trouble being articulate and decided to set it aside to deal with other pressing production related items. Later that evening my phone was barraged by the news of mass shootings in Kansas City, Houston, and Washington D.C. As I have said many times before, as a theatre company we always approach our season planning by asking "Why this show and why now?" With this play, the answer was clear: the truths of this play still resonate.

After the shootings at a bowling alley and a bar in Lewiston, Maine, Dr. Keith Loud, Dartmouth Health Children's Physicianin-Chief and Chair of Pediatrics, Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth, and Dartmouth Health's CEO, Dr. Joanne Conroy, penned an opinion piece entitled "Gun Safety is Public Health, Not Politics." Dr. Loud and Dr. Conroy's article reframed the debate around guns in our state to depoliticize it. While it is common to debate what to do about it, most can agree that gun violence is a problem that needs addressing. After Sunday's matinee, we hope to take one small step in addressing the issue by talking about it. Dr. Loud along with Senator Debra Altschiller and members of the creative team will take part in a panel discussion moderated by professional facilitator Gerri King. All panelists agreed that while this panel is important, the most important thing is that we find a way to talk about the topic and continue that conversation well beyond the closing of this show.

Ultimately, the question can't just be "Why this show and why now?" it has to be "How can this show start a conversation?" or "What can we do as artists to bring communities together?" I hope that your experience of On the Exhale provides you new insight and motivates you to ask questions and continue the conversation.

On the Exhale: Show Resource Guide

According to the Massachusetts Coalition to Prevent Gun Violence, the root causes of gun violence are: Poverty, Trauma, Racism and Oppression in all its forms.

Gun Violence Statistics in the US:

- * As of 2018 there were approximately 400 million civilian owned guns in America. That's 40% of total ownership in the world.
- There are more guns in the US than there are people and cars.
- The Firearm industry was a 63.5 billion dollar industry in 2020.
- \cdot In 2023 there were 656 Mass Shootings in America and 47,406 gun violence deaths.
- According to the CDC, firearms became the leading cause of death for American children and teenagers in 2020. Between 2019 and 2020, firearm deaths for people aged 1-19 increased by a massive 30%.

The Mental Health Impact of Gun Violence:

"The Psychological Impact of mass shootings can result in PTSD, substance misuse, self-harm, major depressive disorders, and panic attacks, among others."


