A Note from the Director

Gabriel, Baby, Alex, Laurie, Carla, Anthie, Fiona. I've never loved any character in any play as much as I love the characters of Paradise Now. This is testimony to the brilliance of playwright Margaret Perry, who has crafted these rich, layered, flawed, striving women with wit, love, and economy, leaving so many secrets unspoken and inviting us – director, actresses, designers, audience – to puzzle out the mysteries. It is also testimony to these seven incredibly talented actresses, who have breathed vibrant and determined life into the characters, inhabiting each surprising layer with ingenuity, vulnerability, and joy.

The world and themes of *Paradise Now!* are important - the action takes place in, and because of, a multi-level marketing enterprise, or MLM, a kind of Ponzi scheme that's driven as much by the promise of friendship, community, support, and a meaningful life as it is by the allure of financial independence and "being your own boss." MLMs attract (or target) women because friendship, community, support, and meaning are our currency.

But I don't think *Paradise Now!* is about MLMs. Not really. I think it's about fierce, determined, complex women who strive to do their very best in an environment where they cannot possibly succeed. Maybe MLMs are the only places where the odds are so severely stacked against a woman's success. But maybe not.
